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## **Mission Statement**

### **Camperships**

Camperships are available to Norwela Council Scouts camping at KSR with their Troops or as Wranglers, in amounts covering up to half of the early bird rate. The campership application will be available at the Council Service Center. The deadline for submitting the application is November 18, 2024, and funds are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. Camperships are awarded to individual Scouts and may not be transferred. All campership applications must include the signatures of a parent or guardian and the registered unit leader. Scouts awarded camperships will be notified and enter the discounted camp fee into the unit's camp registration.

## **Online Registration**

The registration process is to help campers and staff make accurate plans for camp. This guide contains all the information necessary to register for Camp Turkey. We are using Norwela Council's Tentaroo system for our registration, Merit Badge class scheduling and end-of-camp reporting. Online payments are also accepted through the system. **In order to help us plan and ensure that we have accurate numbers of participants and do not overfill classes, all registrations and merit badge class scheduling must be completed online.**

### **Troops should register as a group instead of completing individual registrations.**

Units that do not register as a group cause a significant additional administrative workload, and makes it difficult to ensure members of a unit are kept together. Wranglers (individual Scouts BSA attending), of course, are an exception.

Group Registration for Camp Turkey will open on Tuesday, Sept 3<sup>rd</sup>. There are still many instructors confirming availability, and we plan to open Class Registration no later than Monday, Sept 30<sup>th</sup>. **The Merit Badge Class Schedule listing can change if instructor availability changes.**

Camp Turkey Shirts: All participants, leaders and staff will be provided a Camp Turkey shirt as part of your registration. Shirt sizes are automatically taken from the "Shirt Sizes" provided as part of the "name" registration for each individual in Tentaroo; please ensure this is correct in the profile. It's a mandatory entry in Tentaroo for everyone registered, this ensures the correct shirt sizes are ordered.

- *Due to vendor requirements, please note that only those who register by the Early Bird deadline (October 27<sup>th</sup>) will have their shirts available at Camp Turkey check-in. Those who register at the base or late pricing will have their shirts delivered to the Scout office several weeks after Camp Turkey.*

## **Methods of Payments**

Payments can be made by cash, check, or credit card. Credit Cards can be used by visiting the Scout office or online using Tentaroo. Norwela units may also pay using their unit accounts. **All program fees should be paid prior to Check-In, unless other arrangements are made in advance with the Camp Director or Staff Advisor.**

## **Merit Badges and Programs**

As previously stated, all registration for merit badge sessions will be completed online using Tentaroo. **The Merit Badge listing can be fluid if instructor availability changes.** The most current listing of available merit badges and available classes is available in Tentaroo. If we have to change or cancel a class offering, we will directly notify you that changes must be made to the Scout's schedule in Tentaroo.

## **Dietary Needs / Food Allergies**

The Cook Crew can order some special food for vegetarians and campers with known food allergies. Tentaroo is set-up for you to make notes on each attendee of any special needs, including Serious Allergies or Dietary Restrictions. **Please provide a specific list of food allergies/requests in Tentaroo. If you have any questions on this, please contact the Camp Director at least two weeks prior to arrival at camp.** *We cannot accommodate last minute requests or notifications at check-in.*

## **Arrival and Check-in**

Check-In for everyone is on Saturday, November 23, 2024. Upon arrival at camp, all staff and units will check in at the Hallet Building – look for the large red “REGISTRATION” sign at the Hallet back entrance. You will temporarily park in the Hallet parking lot for check-in, and then be directed to your campsite. After unloading all vehicles must be parked at DogTrot

STAFF: Staff should check in between Noon – 1:00pm. There will be a short staff meeting at 1:00pm in the Hallet Building. Then staff will be released to go set-up their personal and classroom areas.

UNITS: Units should plan on arriving at camp between 2:00 - 5:00 PM. Upon arrival at camp, the Scoutmaster and Senior Patrol Leader will report to the Hallett Building with all paperwork, which includes the following for each unit:

- 1. Scouts BSA Medical Forms Parts A & B are completed prior to arrival at camp** for every scout and adult on camp.
- 2. Completed, Paid in Full Registration in Tentaroo.**

Everyone at Camp Turkey will be issued a colored wristband that is to be worn for the duration of Camp Turkey.

## **Vehicles and Parking**

All vehicles (except approved camp vehicles) should remain parked in the parking lot by the Dogtrot from Saturday after unloading until Tuesday afternoon. The KSR Ranger and Norwela Council employ a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to vehicles on camp property during Camp Turkey.

## **Check Out**

Check-out procedures will begin Tuesday after lunch and should be completed before 5:00 PM. **Units with special check-out considerations should make plans through the Camp Director in advance.** Vehicles will be permitted access to the campsites to load/unload equipment during the day on Tuesday.

The Camp Commissioner, Ranger, or Camp Director, along with the Unit Leader must conduct a final campsite inspection before a unit is dismissed from camp. The **Camp Check-Out Form** must be submitted to the Check-in Location BEFORE a unit leaves camp.

**Medical forms and Closing paperwork should be collected at this time. Any medical forms and registration paperwork not collected by the unit will be forwarded to the Norwela Council Scout Office for pickup at a later date. These forms will be destroyed after a week unless arrangements are made with the Scout Office. Medication should be picked up from the Health Lodge.**

Advancement records of completed merit badges/activities will be available for download in Tentaroo no later than Sunday, December 8, 2024. Leaders will be notified once all advancement records are updated. Paper copies will not be provided to units.

## **Youth Protection Policies for Camp Turkey**

### **Youth Protection Training**

All Adults are required to have a current BSA Youth Protection Training certificate.

### **Two Deep Leadership**

There must be a minimum of two adult leaders with each unit. The unit leader or anyone serving as a unit leader must be at least 21 years of age and a registered member of the Boys Scouts of America. The second adult must also be at least 21 years of age or older. For units with female Scouts under the age of 21, at least one of the adult leaders present must also be a female.

### **Overnight Stays**

All adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be currently registered in an adult fee required position or as an adult program participant, per BSA requirements.

### **No One on One Contact**

One-on-one contact between adults and youth members is not permitted. In situations that require personal conferences, such as a Scoutmaster's Conference, the meeting is to be conducted in view of other adults and youths.

### **Respect of Privacy**

Adult leaders must respect the privacy of youth members in situations such as changing clothes and taking showers at camp and intruding only to the extent that health and safety requirements. Adults must protect their own privacy in similar situations. Many individual shower and restroom stalls are in use at Kinsey Scout Reservation.

### **Appropriate Attire**

Proper clothing for camp activities is always required.

### **Constructive Discipline**

Discipline used in Scouting should be constructive and reflect Scouting's values. Corporal punishment is never permitted in any situation.

### **Hazing is Prohibited**

Physical hazing and initiations are prohibited and may not be included as part of any Scouting activity.

### **Youth Leader Training and Supervision**

Adult leaders must monitor and guide the leadership techniques used by youth leaders and ensure that BSA politics are followed.

### **Wristband Identification**

Everyone on camp property during Camp Turkey will be issued a colored wristband during check-in. The wristband must be worn for the duration of Camp Turkey.

Blue wristband: Under age 18 participant

Green wristband: Age 18 or older participant authorized to stay overnight

Red wristband: Age 18 participant not authorized to stay overnight.

### **Appropriate Sleeping Quarters**

Male and Female leaders must have separate sleeping facilities. Married couples may share the same quarters if appropriate facilities are available. Male and female youth participants will not share the same sleeping facilities. No youth will tent with another youth two years older or younger.

### **Behavior Guidelines**

All members of the Boy Scouts of America are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the principles set forth in the Scout Oath and Law. Physical violence, hazing, bullying, theft, vandalism, insults, and drugs and alcohol have no place in the Scouting program and may result in the revocation of a Scout's membership. Unit leaders are responsible for monitoring the behavior of youth members and interceding when

necessary. The leadership of the camp will determine if misbehavior warrants expelling a camper from the property, and it is the unit and parent's responsibility to transport the camper home.

### **Health and Medical Procedures**

**A current BSA Annual Health and Medical Record, with Parts A & B completed within the past 12 calendar months, is required for all staff, leaders, and campers in attendance at KSR.** Medical forms are shared only on a need-to-know basis and will be on file in the health lodge. Forms may be picked up from the health lodge upon departure from camp. Per relevant laws, uncollected forms will be destroyed upon completion of each camp session. Upon arrival at camp, every medical form is reviewed by the Camp Turkey Health Officer. The check is required by BSA National Standards and helps improve the health and safety of all campers. The Camp Director and unit leaders are informed of campers with limitations so that the appropriate staff members are alerted.

Visitors on camp for less than 24 hours are not required to submit medical forms. In accordance with BSA NCAP standards, all prescription medications are to be kept in locked storage and administered by the Camp Health Officer or approved adult leader in the unit who has accepted responsibility for administration and/or dispensing of medications. An exception may be made for a limited amount of medication to be carried by the camper, leader, parent, or staff member for life-threatening conditions including bee stings or heart medication, inhalers, or for limited quantities of medication approved for use in a first aid kit. All medications should be kept in original containers.

All drug dispensation must be documented using the First Aid Log for Council/District Activity, and are to be available for inspection by the Camp Health Officer.

The Camp Health Officer resides in the health lodge and is available around the clock. The camp maintains an extensive first aid kit, exam room, and two beds. If a camper requires emergency medical services or needs to see a physician, a Scout's parent or guardian will be notified by telephone. Non-emergency transportation must be arranged by the parents or the unit.

### **Unit Leader First Aid**

Unit leaders are encouraged to provide basic first aid for minor cuts, blisters, and scrapes using a unit first aid kit. Please contact the health lodge for anything beyond adult leader skills and training. The camp welcomes the assistance of qualified medical personnel with visiting units.

### **Buddy System**

The buddy system is strictly enforced at KSR. Youth should always make efforts to be in groups of two or more campers. All National policies concerning buddy groups and gender distribution are also enforced.



## **Emergency Procedures: Medical Emergency**

In the event of a medical emergency, the Camp Health Officer should be contacted immediately. If a medical emergency is beyond the skill and training of the Health Officer, the camp staff will contact emergency medical services.

## **Severe Weather**

In case of severe weather, campers should seek shelter in buildings or tents. **At least one adult leader in each unit should have completed BSA Hazardous Weather Training and be familiar with precautions for lightning and tornadoes.** In a tornado warning, campers should seek cover in the nearest solid structure with a slab (Hallett, Wasner, Dining Hall, or shower houses.)

## **Motor Vehicles and Parking**

Parking is provided in two designated parking lots for adult leaders and visitors. Units may use a vehicle to pull trailers to the campsite. After the gear and trailer are at the campsite, the vehicle must return to the designated parking lot. Units may leave the trailer at the campsite to store gear if it is not blocking the way of campers or emergency vehicles. Vehicles should not be moved into camp during the week, and roads through campsites and program areas are restricted to authorized camp vehicles only.

**No ATVs are permitted at the camp outside of the ATV program.**

## **Prohibited Items**

### **Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drugs**

Possession or use of any alcoholic beverage, illegal drugs, or the misuse of prescription drugs is expressly prohibited. Anyone found in violation of this will be asked to leave the camp property and reported to the local law enforcement agency. All Prescription Drugs need to be in their original packaging with pharmacists' labels.

**The use of tobacco products is limited to adults in specifically designated areas.**

### **Firearms, Ammunition, and Archery Equipment**

KSR Camp Turkey Shooting Sports Staff will provide all shooting sports equipment. **Please leave all personal guns, ammunition, bows, and arrows at home.**

## **Fireworks**

Fireworks and pyrotechnic devices are prohibited from possession or use by campers.

## **Troop and Individual Equipment**

Units should prepare detailed checklists to ensure all necessary equipment is brought to camp. A shakedown may also be needed to ensure that unnecessary items stay at home.

### **Please Label all items!**

Metal items: use an engraving tool or permanent marker

Plastic items: Use a soldering iron or wood-burning tool (be careful not to go too deep!) or a permanent marker.

Clothing: sew in clothing labels with names or use permanent laundry markers.

## Camp Turkey Packing List

- Cot or Sleeping Bag

- Camp Cup- you will carry this with you everywhere on camp for hydration. Water is provided in all areas.

- Baby Powder or Anti-Chafe Powder

- Battery Operated Alarm Clock
- Personal medications (with original prescription packaging)

- Other Gear as required for specific merit badge courses or activities as required by the merit badge book or your merit badge counselor.

### **Prohibited Items**

- ❖ Alcohol
- ❖ Personal firearms
- ❖ Tobacco products or Vapes
- ❖ Fireworks
- ❖ Illegal drugs
  - ❖ Video games or gaming devices
  - ❖ Fixed-blade knives
  - ❖ Excessive grooming products
  - ❖ Highly odorous products such as scented body sprays
  - ❖ Excessive amounts of candy
  - ❖ Clothing with inappropriate language or graphics will not be permitted.
  - ❖ No pets of any kind, except for special needs animals, are permitted in camp.
  - ❖ Campers are not permitted to use ATVs (all-terrain vehicles) or UTVs (utility cart vehicles).

## **IDEA Disabilities or Special Needs Accommodations**

If a Scout or Adult needs some extra help to enjoy the camp experience, let us know! Unit leaders should contact the Camp Director prior to camp regarding campers with special needs who require assistance from camp staff. Arrangements should be made in writing so the preparation can be accurate and staff training can be completed for accommodations. Camp is not able to accommodate all possible special needs, but the staff will work diligently to make arrangements where possible.

## **Mobility**

Camp Staff will be able to provide cart transportation to Scouts with special mobility needs between merit badge sessions. Please contact the Camp Director by November 17, 2024, to make arrangements. If there are not enough carts available, the camp staff may issue a special vehicle permit to a unit for the sole purpose of transporting a Scout with mobility needs. There are several wheelchair-accessible showers and restrooms at camp. Campers may bring their own wheelchairs or motorized chairs, but ATVs are not permitted.

## **Uniform and Attire In Camp**

The Official Scouts BSA Field Uniform (Class A) is always an appropriate dress at Camp Turkey. Every camper is expected to wear the Field Uniform at evening meals while performing flag ceremonies, attending chapel, and during campfires. The Activity Uniform (Class B) of an appropriate Scout T-Shirt in place of the uniform shirt, is encouraged at all other times.

Campers should wear sturdy walking or hiking shoes with socks and closed toes. Lighter shoes may be worn at the campsite or at the waterfront. Sandals or shoes without toes, or with gaps or holes, are unsafe and prohibited.

Inappropriate clothing includes sleeveless undershirts, cutoff shirts or shorts, clothes with holes, clothing with alcohol, tobacco, or drug promotions, sexual references, vulgar, sexist, or racist sayings or symbols, gang insignias, and bikini swimsuits or speedos. Questionable or offensive tattoos must remain covered.

## **Leader Meetings**

A meeting for all the adult leaders and senior patrol leaders will be held Saturday night after the evening class session. Updates or program changes will be communicated during meal-times, as needed.

## **Campsite Inspection**

Campsite cleanliness is the responsibility of the unit and unit leadership. The Camp Commissioner will perform daily inspections of each campsite for cleanliness, originality, impressiveness, and organization.

## **Dining Hall and Meals**

Before each meal, the camp assembles at the campsite markers on the parade ground. The camp staff facilitates the flag ceremony, grace, proves program notes, and dismisses Scouts to go eat. The table waiter system, relying on a few Scouts from each unit, is used in the Dining Hall for setting up and cleaning up after meals.

## **Flag Ceremonies**

The camp will assemble twice daily for opening and closing flag ceremonies. Scouts will raise and lower the flag every day after Saturday. Scouts and leaders are expected to attend the evening flag ceremony in Field Uniforms. Scouts should wear the Field Uniform when performing any flag ceremony as the honor guard.

## **General Information on Merit Badge Sessions**

Experiencing camp through merit badges is the core of the Camp Turkey program for Scouts, BSA. Merit badge sessions are offered by the program staff throughout each day during four scheduled session times.

Our **Trail to First Class Program** has been designed to introduce new Scouts to the fundamental skills they will need throughout their scouting journey.

The Camp Turkey program offers many merit badge programs for every skill level. Merit Badge class sessions last an hour and thirty minutes with fifteen minutes in between to travel to the next class. With several trails strategically placed to connect key parts of the camp, this allows more than adequate time to navigate between the areas.

Attendance in class does not guarantee the completion of any badge. Scouts are encouraged to participate fully in each session to receive the maximum benefit. Unforeseen circumstances, such as inclement weather, may result in incomplete coursework.

Scouts should come to camp with a familiarity with the subjects they will be learning about for the week. Merit badge pamphlets are available for purchase at the trading post during camp but acquiring a merit badge pamphlet from the Scout Service Center prior to camp is recommended. It is a good idea to bring a spiral notebook and pencil or the printed merit badge workbook for each merit badge session. The US Scouting Service project has a list of printable merit badge workbooks available at <http://usscouts.org/mb/worksheets/list.asp>

The first requirement of many merit badges is to know first aid procedures for common injuries or illnesses that may occur during the associated activity. Counselors will touch on this topic, but Scouts should be familiar with basic first aid procedures before attempting more adventurous merit badge topics.

Scouts will be able to complete several merit badges at camp. Some merit badges have requirements that should be completed prior to camp and some requirements may only be completed outside of camp. Scouts must demonstrate completion of each requirement before it is approved by a counselor.

Camp Turkey merit badges and programs are run through various program areas on Kinsey Scout Reservation. This is to ensure qualified instruction by knowledgeable counselors and a great experience by Scouts in each area.

### **Field Trips**

Scouts enrolled in certain merit badges will have the opportunity to take field trips off camp property. If adult leaders with vehicles are needed, the Commissioner will make an announcement at the daily leader meeting. Adults interested in helping us with transportation need to have their Driver's License and vehicle insurance available to photocopy for camp records.

### **The Trail to First Class (TFC)**

This hallmark program is designed for new Scouts, especially those coming to camp for the very first time and working on their Tenderfoot through First Class requirements. This is the ideal experience for the novice scout, designed to deliver a hands-on experience of the Patrol Method. Participants in the program begin with the history of Scouting, the origin of the Scout Spirit, and the concept of participatory citizenship. Scouts will be covering requirements for knots, lashings, wood tool use and care, orienteering, plant and animal identification, fire building, cooking and first aid. Each Scout will need a personal first aid kit, and their Scout handbook. Scout skills, the Patrol Method, and the Buddy System are stressed throughout the week.

Please note that this is merely an introductory course in the essentials of Scouting, even active participation in the curriculum will not create a First Class Scout in one week's time. It will be up to the Scout's home unit and Scoutmaster to fully achieve this lofty goal because there is so much to learn. TFC classes will be held in the Fort Dan Beard Program area found on the camp map.

## **Camp Turkey Activities**

### **A Scout is Reverent**

Sunday evening is our interfaith chapel service. Join us after dinner for fellowship through faith.

### **Order of the Arrow Night**

OA Members are encouraged to bring their sash and wear it to dinner on Monday night. Then after dinner OA members are encouraged to meet at the OA Yatasi Lodge building for a special event for all members of the Order of the Arrow. The Lodge is providing snacks, games and a space for fellowship. So if you are a member of the Order of the Arrow, please plan on attending our OA Night on Monday night.

### **Bear's Den Trading Post**

The Bear's Den Trading Post has new items this fall. In addition to games available for use in the Trading Post, Scouts can also check out sports equipment and stock up on souvenirs, snacks, and scouting supplies. The Bear's Den is open most hours of the day and evening except for meals and camp-wide activities. Accepted payment methods include credit and debit cards, checks, and cash. All prices include sales tax.

There is not an ATM machine at camp.



## Camp Turkey Schedule

Based on feedback from the last several years of Camp Turkey, we have adjusted the schedule to have meal times and merit badge sessions be the same time on each day. This should make it easier for everyone, Scouts, Leaders and Staff, to follow the daily schedule. The schedule is included below.
